Who we are

Beantown Jewish Gardens (*Ganei Beantown***)** runs community-wide events that focus on Jewish education and teaching about food justice and working for a more just and sustainable food system. Our high quality, pluralistic programming has shown that we can come together as a community to delve into the issues that affect us all for generations to come.

Our mission is building community through experiential food and agriculture education rooted in Jewish text, tradition, and culture. Facilitating a connection between Judaism, food, and agriculture breathes new life into Jewish tradition, community, and identity, and engages the Jewish community in the question of how to feed ourselves and the world in a just and sustainable manner.

Beantown Jewish Gardens brings people together for agricultural and food learning and celebrations rooted in Jewish values of:

- L'ovda ul'shomra (To Till and To Tend: Being responsible stewards of the earth);
- *Gemilut Chasadim* (Bestowing Kindnesses: Being responsible stewards of each other);
- *Tikkun Olam* (Repairing the World: Being responsible stewards for the next generation).

What we're doing

The day provides multiple opportunities for community engagement, including focused resource sharing opportunities, informational displays, garden tours, hands-on activities, learning opportunities (text study, expert panels, workshops), local companies, kosher, ethical snacks and live music. Building upon our seven years of running the Boston Jewish Food Conference, we have greatly expanded the scope of our vendor fair to reach a wider audience.

Via programming partnerships with local sustainable agriculture initiatives we engage and connect our community where they live and ground them in the land around them. It is the coming together of these two communities that makes our focus unique.
